WPIC Library to Close



The Library of Western Psychiatric Institute & Clinic (WPIC) will close permanently on Friday, December 19, 2008. In the future, reference consultation and educational services will be available to the WPIC community through Falk Library.

Plans for disposition of the print collection are incomplete. January-March 2009 will be a transitional period, during which the books, videos and bound journals will be sorted and packed. Some materials will be moved to Falk Library, while others will be sent to the HSLS remote storage facility. See the article "Obtaining Materials from the WPIC"

Obtaining Materials from the WPIC Print Collection

During the transition period the WPIC print collection will be available by request. The information below describes the process for obtaining these materials depending on your affiliation.

If you are affiliated with UPMC or one of the University of Pittsburgh schools of the health sciences requests for books, videos, or journals articles can be submitted online through https://www.hsls.pitt.edu/services/documentdelivery/index_html). Once your request has been processed:

- Books and videos from the WPIC collection may be picked up at one of the following HSLS library locations: Falk Library, UPMC Shadyside Libraries, Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh Libraries.
- Copies of articles from the WPIC collection will be scanned and delivered as a PDF file at no charge.

If you are at the University of Pittsburgh, but not affiliated with one of the schools of the health sciences requests must be submitted through the <u>University Library System</u> (http://clioserver.library.pitt.edu/clioweb/Inside/).

If you are not affiliated with Pitt or UPMC:

- Inquire about interlibrary loan services from a local public library. Many public libraries are able to order copies of articles or books through their interlibrary loan networks. Fees may apply.
- Register for document delivery services with another health sciences library through the <u>Loansome Doc</u> (https://docline.gov/loansome/login.cfm) program. When signing up, look for libraries that specify they provide services to "unaffiliated health professionals" or "public users." Charges and services vary for each library.

<u>UPMC Shadyside Libraries Conference Area Now Available</u>

Who can reserve the room?

UPMC Shadyside clinical staff and faculty can reserve the room for use during regular library hours (Monday - Friday 8 a.m. - 6 p.m.).

How do I reserve the room?

You may reserve the room either in person or by calling 412-623-2415. Library staff will make your arrangements. Reservations are available on a first-come first-served basis.

What technology and equipment are available?

The room is equipped with a projection/LCD monitor. There is no computer in the room, but you may bring your own laptop or borrow one from the front desk for up to four hours. Internet is available via the Pitt wireless network –no UPMC network connection is available.

May I provide food for a meeting in the conference room?

No food is permitted. Drinks with a lid are allowed.

CINAHL Users – Make the Transition to EBSCO



As of January 1st 2009, CINAHL, the nursing and allied health bibliographic database, will be available only through the EBSCOhost search interface. Though the look and "feel" of the EBSCOhost interface is different from that of CINAHL's current OVID interface, users will continue to have access to CINAHL's familiar search tools.

To access CINAHL EBSCOhost, go to the <u>HSLS home</u> (http://www.hsls.pitt.edu/) page. Type "CINAHL" into the search.HSLS text box and click on the Search button. At the top of your search results, find the HSLS Electronic Resources box – it will contain a link that takes you to EBSCOhost CINAHL.

ILL/Document Delivery Fee Increase

Beginning January 1, 2009, the cost for obtaining an article or book from another library, as well as the fees for scanning articles by library staff, will increase from \$3.50 to \$5.00 per request. Even though our costs have continually risen, we have not raised our fees in nine years. This \$5.00 fee, which is more in line with what other academic health sciences libraries charge, is still a bargain considering HSLS pays \$11-\$15 per request, plus the costs of interlibrary loan copyright royalties.

Rush and priority <u>fees</u> (http://www.hsls.pitt.edu/services/documentdelivery/fees.html) will remain the same and there will still be no charge to obtain copies from HSLS storage or books from any University of Pittsburgh library. To request materials use HSLS <u>Document Delivery</u> (http://www.hsls.pitt.edu/services/documentdelivery/index_html) Services.

HSLS Consumer Health Information Page Featured

The HSLS <u>consumer health information</u> (http://www.hsls.pitt.edu/guides/chi) page was highlighted on the National Library of Medicine's Web site under the <u>Middle Atlantic Region featured projects</u> (http://www.nlm.nih.gov/lo/profiles08/mar.html). The consumer health page allows for quick and easy retrieval of information on patient education and safety, service programs, HSLS consumer health collections, and more.

To conduct a search, users have a choice of five resource tabs: MedlinePlus, Patient Education, Patient Safety, Local Support & Services, and Books & Videos. Results are displayed, using Vivisimo® technology, with clusters presented to the left. These clusters group results into related topics or categories and allow users to quickly narrow a search.

HSLS Associate Director Selected as Leadership Fellow



Congratulations to Nancy Tannery, HSLS associate director for User Services, who has been named as a National Library of Medicine/Association of Academic Health Sciences Libraries Leadership (NLM/AAHSL) Fellow.

The NLM/AAHSL Leadership Fellows Program is focused on preparing emerging leaders for the position of library director in academic health sciences libraries. During this one-year program fellows have the opportunity to develop their knowledge and skills in a variety of learning settings, including exposure to leadership in another library environment. They are paired with mentors who are academic health sciences library directors. Nancy is paired with James Shedlock, director of Galter Health Sciences Library at Northwestern University. In addition to the individual relationship with their mentors, fellows benefit from working collaboratively with the other fellows and mentors. Five fellows are selected each year and thirty fellows have par-

ticipated in the program since its inception in 2002.

Nancy has worked at HSLS since 1995, beginning as a reference librarian at Falk Library. In her current role as Associate Director, she oversees of all HSLS instructional programs, reference and access services, as well as specialized information service areas such as History of Medicine and Molecular Biology. Nancy holds degrees from Pennsylvania State University (BS) and the University of Pittsburgh (MLS), and had a career in research before coming to HSLS.

The 2008-09 fellow class met for the first time on October 31 at the annual meeting of the Association of American Medical Colleges in San Antonio, CA. The program year concludes next September with a Capstone event and graduation in Washington, DC.

Falk Library Renovations Underway

Renovations in Falk Library's Rare Book and computer areas will begin on December 15, 2008. This two-month project includes long-delayed upgrades to the cooling and humidity controls for Falk Library's collection of valuable older materials housed on the main floor, and construction of a new, properly ventilated room on the mezzanine floor to house the computer servers managing HSLS eresources and other online services.

The Rare Books have been moved to another area in Falk Library for safekeeping during construction, but are still available for use by <u>appointment</u> (http://www.hsls.pitt.edu/about/libraries/falk/rarebook/using.html). No service disruptions are anticipated during construction of the new computer server room. The construction crew will try to keep noise and other disturbances to a minimum.

Where are the Journals?



Looking around the HSLS libraries, you will notice fewer print journals than in years past. We are changing our subscriptions to the electronic version of journals whenever possible and cancelling the print subscriptions in most cases. Each library may maintain a small print browsing collection. In addition, print journals that have no electronic counterpart will continue to be available.

What are we doing with our older print journals? Because of space considerations, HSLS libraries are moving bound copies of pre-1990 print journals to off-site storage. We will retain one copy of each title.

If electronic access to an older journal volume is not available but a print copy is maintained in storage, patrons can order a copy of the article quickly and easily through Document Delivery (http://www.hsls.pitt.edu/services/documentdelivery/index_html). There is no charge for this service.
